### Pipeline project to disrupt Ramon Road

**PALM SPRINGS** -- Traffic on Ramon Road is expected to be disrupted through Thursday while workers install valves for an upcoming water pipeline project, according to a statement from Desert Water Agency.

The water agency said workers will be in and around the intersection of Ramon Road and Crossley Road from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. through Wednesday and until around 7 p.m. Thursday.

The intersection will remain open to traffic, but some lanes on Ramon will be closed, according to the water agency.

### Hope Memorial Mass to be held Wednesday

A cavalcade of Hollywood stars is expected to attend a private Memorial Mass and tribute to Palm Springs' longtime honorary mayor Bob Hope on Wednesday in Los Angeles County.

Hope died last month at his Toluca Lake home almost two months after turning 100.

The Mass will be celebrated at 10 a.m. at St. Charles Borromeo Church in Toluca Lake. The tribute will be held at 3 p.m. at the Television Academy of Arts and Sciences in North Hollywood.

Hope publicist Ward Grant declined to reveal names or numbers of stars expected to attend but said it would be "a lot."

Another memorial has been discussed for the Coachella Valley after summer.

## **Citizens police academy applications available**

## **Riverside County citizens academy starts Sept. 11**

The Riverside County Sheriff's Department will begin its eight-week citizens academy beginning Sept. 11.

Classes will be 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. each Thursday in Riverside at the Ben Clark Public Safety Training Center at 3423 Davis Ave. The academy is open to Riverside County residents 18 or older with no prior felony convictions and no misdemeanor arrests within one year of applying for the academy.

Cadets will learn the daily operations of the department and law enforcement policies and procedures. Guest speakers will cover subjects related to forensics, hostage negotiations, emergency services team, media relations and the volunteer program.

The eight-week course also will include tours of the Robert Presley Detention Center and the Coroner's Office in Perris.
